

# Accounting Course Number: 22:010:605 Course Title: Corporate Taxation

#### COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed for tax students to fully explore the tax ramifications facing corporations throughout its life cycle. Students will study the tax authority as applied to both the corporation as an entity, as well as to the corporate shareholders. This includes initial start-ups and corporate formation, choices of capitalization including debt vs. equity, ongoing operations, distributions to shareholders, partial redemptions of shareholder stock by corporations, and corporate liquidations.

The course format will include lectures, discussions, and some group problem solving. There will be a heavy emphasis of studying the Internal Revenue Code and other primary sources of tax law (Regulations Court Cases, etc.) for students to grasp a deep understanding of the law as it pertains to corporate taxation. This will be reinforced through class lectures, and solving homework problems related to each lesson, enabling the tax student to apply and understand the tax law covered in this course.

## LEARNING GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

This course is designed to help students develop skills and knowledge in the fundamental tax issues facing corporations as well as corporate shareholders. Students will gain a deep knowledge in the tax treatment of "lifecycle" transactions between the corporations and its owners. It is my goal that each student will be

able to identify all of the tax issues involved in a transaction and apply the appropriate tax law to solve those problems.

# **PREREQUISITES**

It is advisable that students should have already successfully completed the graduate level Fundamentals of Income Tax course.

All students are expected to read the assigned material and complete the assigned homework <u>prior to coming to class</u>. It is <u>expected that you come to class well prepared to participate</u> in class discussions and in the homework review. From time to time, I may use PowerPoint, <u>BUT THIS IS NOT appropriate for you to use as lecture notes</u>. When I do use PowerPoint, it is ONLY to "guide" my lectures (i.e. PP is not detailed).

This class meets on to accommodate students work schedules. Many students find this to be the best time during busy tax seasons. If for any reason you cannot make it to our location, you will be able to log into **WebEx** during our class times. I will be hosting a WebEx at that time with a running feed. Again, live attendance and participation is strongly recommended. The WebEx link will be posted to Canvas under "course documents".
