

Economics, Applied Course Number: 22:223:591 Course Title: Aggregate Economic Analysis

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides a framework for studying the structure and performance of the overall macroeconomy, the effects of government policies, and the implications for important business decisions. We begin by learning how to measure the performance of an economy in terms of GDP, inflation, unemployment, and other macroeconomic variables. Based on that, we analyze the key factors that determine long-run economic growth and drive short-term business cycle fluctuations. An important part of this course is dedicated to understanding the main components and mechanisms of state-of-the-art frameworks for macroeconomic analysis, as used by the Fed and other important policy institutions. With this background, we are able to investigate the potential effects of macroeconomic policies, and to understand how policy decisions can be evaluated quite differently depending on the underlying assumptions. Finally, the course studies the role and implications of the international environment for the macroeconomy.

LEARNING GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course, students should have the ability to understand and critically assess the implications of real-world macroeconomic events and policies for the US and the global economy as well as for specific businesses. Students should particularly be able to put economic material from secondary sources (such as the Wall Street Journal, The Economist, etc.) into a broader perspective, with the help of a deeper understanding of the underlying economic mechanisms. To this end, they should utilize the macroeconomic analysis tools taught in this course, including the location of economic data, the empirical analysis of such data, and the evaluation of real-world situations through the lens of economic models. By taking this course, students should advance their analytical and critical thinking skills and improve their abilities to communicate about economic concepts in written and in oral form.

PREREQUISITES

Managerial Economic Analysis (22:223:521 / 22:223:581) is a prerequisite for this class.

EVALUATION AND GRADING POLICY

This course uses a combination of assignments, classroom lectures, discussions, and exams to convey the material. Each student is expected to contribute regularly to classroom discussion. There will be one midterm and one final exam.

The final course grade will be allocated according to the following formula:

Class participation: A portion of your grade (5%) will be based on class participation. Class participation will be graded based on your general participation in class in the form of questions and comments. There will be ample opportunity to contribute to the classroom discussion.

Individual presentation: Each student is required to give a short individual presentation in which she/he provides some information on her/his professional background and insights into the current work focus and interests. The presentation should also include examples of where macroeconomic issues play a role for the student's work and how a deeper understanding of these issues could help. The dates for these individual presentations will be coordinated within the first two weeks of class.

Assignments: Students are expected to work in teams on the assignments/homeworks – each team should only turn in one copy of an assignment. Please form groups of 2 in the first two weeks of classes and send me an email to register your team. Students who have not found a group within the first two weeks will automatically be assigned to a team.

All assignments must be submitted on time except in extraordinary circumstances. All late submissions are at the full discretion of the instructor and may be subject to a penalty. For successful completion of an assignment, students are required to attend the presentation session (held on the same day that the assignment is due, see course schedule below) and to present their work in case their team is selected.

Midterm and final exam: The midterm and the final exam will be closed book and closed notes. You will be allowed to use a non-programmable calculator (not a computer, smart phone, etc.).

The final exam is cumulative and places more weight on the second half of the course, which builds on the contents of the first half.
