# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Law permeates every aspect of supply chain transactions and processes. As supply chain managers, you must be cognizant of, and strategic about, the ways that law structures your decisions and choices. You will need to be able to deploy law and regulations to gain a competitive advantage in the marketplace. This course will examine a wide variety of legal topics that shape and impact domestic and global supply chain management and purchasing. The structure of the course will roughly reflect the process of taking a product from design to production and sale. These topics include but are not limited to: contracts, sales of goods, intellectual property, antitrust, trade law, transportation law, dispute settlement, and labor and environmental supply chain compliance.

## **COURSE MATERIALS**

#### **Textbook**:

We are using chapters from two textbooks: Managers and the Legal Environment by Bagley ISBN-13: 978-1337555081, and International Business Law, by Schaffer et al ISBN-13: 978-1305972599. These texts are available as digital textbooks through Cengage. You can buy access to these texts as well as to the Mindtap tools that we will be using by subscribing to Cengage Unlimited at https://www.cengage.com/unlimited. The versions you buy must have Mindtap access included, so be wary of purchasing the text through other vendors. Once you purchase the subscription, you will have an access code that you enter once you enter into the course, which you should do through the Canvas links.

In addition, I am requiring you to read the Wall Street Journal and to pay close attention to the logistics and supply chain issues and try and look at them from the perspective of law and regulation. Go to this website https://education.wsj.com/search/ and enter Rutgers into the search box. Please be sure to set up email alerts for the Logistics Report, and the Risk and Compliance report.

# LEARNING GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- **Recognize and know the definitions** of a variety of legal terms, concepts, and rules that are pertinent to supply chain management.
- **Apply** those terms and concepts to hypothetical and real life fact patterns and events that you will encounter in managing the supply chain.
- **Critically assess** those rules and concepts and evaluate whether or not you believe those are normatively good or bad rules from the perspective of societal values and policy.
- Identify potential supply chain legal issues and risks that will arise in your everyday professional lives.
- Articulate legal issues and your ideas concisely and accurately.
- **Be an educated client** who will know how to ask a lawyer pertinent and important questions.

## **COURSE METHOD**

This course is a fully online course. Each week we will read a portion of the assigned textbooks, paying special attention to the cases and highlighted terms. The readings and lectures should be completed at the latest by **Day 5**, which is (), but preferably sooner. You should be forewarned that this course has an *above average* amount of reading and I expect you complete it. If you don't do the reading and complete the Mindtap assignments, it will be reflected in your performance. The readings will be accompanied by a video lecture by the instructor that will include PowerPoint slides. You will be responsible for **completing the Mindtap assignments that are linked to in the Canvas modules**.

Your **participation grade** will be based on your discussion of the assigned discussion question with groups that you have been randomly assigned to. You will know your group based on the group letter that appears before the "discussion question" content link each week. Often, these will be discussion questions assigned from the text, or from other sources such as journal or newspaper articles. You will be graded on your **own participation**, not that of the group as a whole. Although you will be assessed individually, part of your grade will be based on the degree to which you have responded to your colleagues' arguments, not just put forth your own. As a general expectation, you should respond at least twice to others' arguments and comments.

Your initial discussion contribution should be made on day 6, which is a (), so as to ensure sufficient time for your colleagues to respond. Your replies to your colleagues are due on day 7. You are of course free to submit your first entry sooner than day 6.

Finally, you will be writing one current events paper on contemporary issues related to supply chain law and governance. The goal of these papers is to have you analyze current issues that are of personal and professional interest to you. These are short – two page – papers that should a) identify the issue, b) state the basic facts, c) present arguments on both sides of the issue, and d) provide your conclusion. The conclusion can be how you think the legal issue should be resolved, what you think the law should be, etc. You will find a lengthier description in the course modules.

## **GRADING POLICY**

### A. Assignments: 10%

The assignments utilize the Mindtap learning system by Cengage. These assignments begin on module two. You have access to it when you purchase the Cengage unlimited subscription. Assignments are largely multiple choice questions that are automatically graded. If you get a question wrong, you will have the opportunity to correct it. However, if you get a question wrong, make sure that you go back and figure out why you got it wrong, and then try again. If you do not do an assignment, you will receive a zero. Doing these exercises are an excellent way to learn the material and prepare for the exams.

## B. Participation: 20%

Your **participation grade** will be based on your discussion of the assigned discussion question. Sometimes these will be questions assigned from the text or based on a case or other material that I ask you to read. You will be graded on your **own participation**, not that of the class as a whole. Although you will be assessed individually, part of your grade will be based on the degree to which you have responded to your colleagues' arguments, not just how you have put forth your own.

## C. Current Legal Events Paper: 5%

You will be writing one short 2–3-page paper on a supply chain law topic of your choice. Details are found in the modules. This paper is due on day 7 of unit 5.

## D. Midterm 30% (Multiple Choice and Written)

The exam will be **closed book** using Proctortrack. This exam will cover all the material covered up until the exam.

## E. Final Exam 35% (Multiple Choice and Written)

The exam will be **closed book** and administered online using Proctortrack. This exam will cover all the material studied after the midterm.

**Study Advice:** To study for the exams, I recommend that you, first, study the terms that are listed at the end of each chapter and memorize their definitions. You need to memorize the terms and be able to apply them to fact patterns for both the multiple choice and written sections of the exam. The written questions will be very similar to the case problems that are at the end of the chapters. I recommend that you take time to work through those problems as part of your preparation.
