COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides an overview of Business Statistics and its role in the decision-making processes of an organization. It introduces key concepts of characterizing and quantifying uncertainty, and the development, analysis, and interpretation of results of mathematical models which describe uncertain behavior. Topics covered include descriptive statistical techniques; probability; discrete and continuous random variables and probability distributions; the Central Limit Theorem; confidence intervals; and hypothesis testing.

COURSE MATERIALS

TEXT: Levine, Stephan, & Szabat, *Statistics for Managers Using Microsoft Excel*, 8th Edition, Prentice Hall, 2017.

SOFTWARE: *Microsoft Excel; download Excel Data Files from text website* www.pearsonhighered.com/levine

A basic familiarity with Microsoft Excel is required prior to the beginning of the course (see Appendices B and C of text).

LEARNING GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

This course is designed to help students develop skills and knowledge in the following area(s):

- Business knowledge. Students will have a command of business statistics theory and practice. Students who complete this course will demonstrate:
 - a) Mastery of fundamental business statistics concepts and an ability to integrate and apply these concepts to solve practical business problems.
 - b) Proficiency at analyzing and interpreting numerical data to solve practical business problems.
- Ethical judgement.
 - Students who complete this course will demonstrate:
 - a) Recognition of ethical dilemmas in decision-making scenarios.
 - b) Ability to critically evaluation business decision-making scenarios and develop innovative and ethical solutions.
- Global perspective. Students will have the breadth of perspective necessary to effectively function in a global and diverse business environment.

Students who complete this course will demonstrate:

- a) Ability to lead and/or participate in culturally and demographically diverse teams and classroom environment.
- Persuasive communication. Students will be effective communicators. Students who complete this course will demonstrate:
 - a) Ability to construct clear, concise, and convincing written descriptions of how statistical techniques are used in their businesses.
 - b) Ability to construct and deliver clear, concise, and convincing oral presentations.

Students develop these skills and knowledge through the following course activities and assignments:

- Lectures. Class lectures focus on the underlying theory and application of basic descriptive and inferential statistical techniques to business situations. A significant amount of time is allocated to examples and homework solutions to illustrate the concepts covered in the lectures, and to a discussion of reading assignments.
- **Readings.** Readings from newspapers and magazines relevant to each topic are posted on canvas.rutgers.edu. In addition to required reading from the textbook, these readings are mandatory and will be discussed in class.
- **Homework**. Homework problems on the topics covered will be assigned at the end of every lecture and reviewed at the beginning of the next class. Assignments by topic are shown in the table at the end of this syllabus.
- Written assignments. Each student is required to individually submit a written description (maximum of one typed page) on how the concepts covered in each class could be used in his/her work. These assignments will be due at the beginning of the next class, submitted as typed hard copy on standard 8 ½ x 11 paper, and must include a brief description of the organization and the specific problem being addressed, the data to be used, how the specific statistical technique will be applied, and how the results will be used. All assignments must be submitted to Grammarly (software available to RBS students), errors corrected, and the Grammarly report submitted with the assignment in order to receive credit. Selected submissions will be read to the class each week. Late assignments are not accepted.
- **Examinations**. There will be one midterm examination, during class 5, and one final examination, during class 10. <u>You are expected to be present for the scheduled examinations</u>. If you cannot be here on the scheduled date, you <u>must</u> let me know <u>beforehand</u> and make alternative arrangements. Examinations are non-cumulative, closed book, and closed notes. Only calculators without wireless capability are permitted to be used during examinations.
- **Team Presentation**. Each study group will be expected to make a 10-minute presentation on an application of one of the topics in either this course or the Analytical Techniques course. The application must pertain to a specific problem in one of the group members' organizations, using real data from that organization. A proposal for the presentation is due from each group at the beginning of class 4; teams whose proposals are not chosen for the fall semester will submit new proposals covering the application of a topic in the Analytical Techniques course for the spring semester.
